THE ARDOCH ALGONQUIN MANOMIN KEEZIS SINGERS AND ALLIES

Performing the 'Grandfather' drum, usually reserved for pow-wows, the musicians will first open the drum before performing an honour song for Bob. The drum is a gift from the women to the men of the community. The dancers are young adults of the Ardoch Algonquin First Nation.

A pianist and composer, Kathryn released a solo album and collaborated with David Francey (*Songs For a Christmas Eve.*) A few weeks after moving to their off-grid acreage, she and her family discovered that a mining company was exploring for uranium five minutes down the road. She has been fighting the proposed mine ever since.

An independent Inuk singer-songwriter, Susan has released six albums and has a seventh in the works. She has received three Junos, two awards from the Canadian Country Music Association, a National Aboriginal Achievement
